



Q2. Male or Female




Q3. To which of the following age categories do you belong?




Q4. Which of the following best describes how long you have lived in this community?





You see many active, healthy-looking seniors in this locality.


We have good facilities for our young people.

Local people are motivated to learn new skills and develop themselves.



We have at least one festival annually that generates a feeling of magic and excitement.






Q12 Environmental Vibrancy




Q13. How would you describe the impact of recent population changes on your community?


